We wish Carl well in his future endeavors as he continues to serve the citizens of this community by leading the Southeast Missouri Law Enforcement Academy, developing professional, well-trained officers for the future.

Having served as the Interim Chief of Police since August of 2012, I have gained an even greater admiration of the entire staff here at the Cape Girardeau Police Department. Having worked the long hours, missing family holiday events, and kids' t-ball games, it is now with great appreciation and honor to work with the men and women of this Department who, day-in and day-out, represent their chosen profession with pride, integrity, and professionalism.

As a matter of a quick statistical synopsis for year 2012, the Cape Girardeau Police Department responded to 53,783 calls for service which generated nearly 11,000 written reports. Arrests made totaled 3,864 and traffic citations issued equaled 7,001.

While there was a slight overall increase in Part I crimes when compared to 2011, a couple items stand-out as concerning. Year 2011 had a significant increase in robberies reported. In 2012 robberies reported were down to years previous to 2011; however burglaries reported to the Department were significantly up. Measures to address those issues have already been taken in 2013 and we expect a significant reduction in burglaries with those actions. Arson cases also witnessed an increase from three reported in 2011 to twenty reported in 2012.

Accomplishments that we achieved in 2012 are listed herein, but one of the most noticeable by the citizens may be the new patrol style vehicles now utilized by the Department. In 2011, Ford Motor Company no longer made available the popular "Police Rated" Crown Victoria. Many departments who had utilized this style of vehicle for years were forced to make a change. Using a team approach we decided to purchase the new "Police Rated" Ford Sedans for our patrol functions and we now outfit our evidence technicians with Ford Utility Vehicles.

The commitment, loyalty, and perseverance of all the members of the Cape Girardeau Police Department prove to be the strength of our organization's level of service and accomplishments. Additionally, we thank the Mayor, City Council, the City Manager, all city employees and most importantly the residents of Cape Girardeau for their continued support.

#### PATROL DIVISION

The Patrol Division provides the primary law enforcement function of the Police Department by maintaining a uniform presence 24 hours a day. A typical Cape Girardeau Police Officer spends his shift answering calls for service, conducting traffic enforcement, interacting with the community, writing reports, issuing citations, working accidents, making arrests and a variety of other activities typical of most police departments. Our officers conduct proactive patrols in neighborhoods and in our business areas to deter crime and improve our visibility.

The Division is divided into four platoons of ten officers each, working 12-hour shifts. Each platoon consists of one sergeant, one corporal, and eight patrolmen. Two patrolmen on each platoon are designated as shift evidence technicians.

Two K-9 officers are also assigned to the Patrol Division.

#### Special Response Team



SRT Deployments for 2012: 17

The Special Response Team (SRT), commonly known as SWAT, is a group of highly trained tactical officers designed for deployment during critical incidents. These incidents include but are not limited to hostage situations, barricaded subjects, high-risk search warrants, high profile escorts, and crowd control.

The ten operators of the SRT serve on a voluntary, part-time basis. They train a minimum of eight hours per month in addition to the critical incident operations throughout the year.

#### PATROL DIVISION

The Cape Girardeau Police Department's K-9 Unit utilizes two highly trained dogs who, along with their handlers, make up a unique team responsible for building searches and suspect searches as well as narcotic detection and tracking. In order for the police dogs to continue to be one of the most effective and diverse tools utilized in police work today, weekly training for the dogs and handlers is mandated.

# Detective Unit

Cases Assigned: 1,233 Clearance Rate: 25% The Cape Girardeau Police Department's Criminal Investigations Division is comprised of one sergeant, three corporals, six investigators, and one civilian records clerk. Three detectives are assigned to investigate drug cases full-time. The division currently has one detective who specializes in forensic examinations of computers, internet crimes, and sex crime cases. Additionally, one detective is assigned to investigate juvenile crime.

The detectives are responsible for investigating serious crimes against persons as well as property crimes, normally referred to as Part 1 Crimes. The detectives work closely with other divisions of the Cape Girardeau Police Department as well as other law enforcement agencies to solve crime.

Scientific Investigations Unit



The Scientific Investigations Unit (SIU) is comprised of one supervisor and one records clerk. SIU is responsible for maintaining all physical evidence collected by the Cape Girardeau Police Department; develop and maintain all photographs taken by the Department; and to process and maintain all fingerprints that are collected by officers of the Department. In addition to the two personnel assigned to this Unit, each patrol platoon is assigned two evidence technicians who are trained in crime scene searches and collection/ preservation of evidence. The Unit also works closely with the Missouri State Highway Patrol's Crime Laboratory and other local agencies.

In 2012, the Unit coded 2,840 pieces of evidence.

#### **Professional Standards Unit**

The Professional Standards Unit investigates internal and external complaints of employee misconduct to determine if there were any violations of policy or law.

During 2012, four Professional Standards Investigations were conducted involving four officers. Of those investigations, two were "Unfounded" complaints and two were sustained.



#### **CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS**

Several employees of the Cape Girardeau Police Department serve on the Cape Girardeau/Bollinger County Major Case Squad (MCS) in addition to their positions within the Department. The MCS was initiated in the late 1970's when Cape Girardeau County was plagued with a series of murders. Since 1983, the MCS, made up of officers and detectives from seven law enforcement agencies has solved 41 of 44 cases (93% clearance rate).

2012 Major Case Squad Activations



The MCS was activated September 6, 2012 for the homicide of Jeffrey Robins after he was found shot to death in his rural Bollinger County home. The MCS disbanded after being activated for 7 days. The case is still active and being investigated by the Bollinger County Sheriff's Office.

The MCS was again activated on December 16, 2012 for a deadly shooting at "The Spot" nightclub in Cape Girardeau. Nicholas D. Gilbert of Sikeston was found inside the nightclub after the Department responded to reports of shots fired. The arrest of Malcolm Harris came less than 20 hours after the activation. Harris is currently incarcerated, awaiting trial.

These were the first activations of the Squad since the disappearance of Jacque S. Waller. Charges of first-degree murder and two counts of tampering with evidence were brought against Clay Waller, Jacque's estranged husband in late 2012. Trial is set for September 9-20, 2013 at the Cape Girardeau County Courthouse in Jackson. Jacque's body has never been discovered.

# Traffic Unit

The Traffic Unit is staffed with one sergeant, one corporal, and five commissioned police officers.

The Unit is responsible for a variety of traffic-related activities. The primary responsibilities of this Unit include traffic enforcement and traffic crash analysis which includes the reconstruction of major accidents. The Unit also assists in the coordination of special events including parades or any walking event.

Officers are specially trained in the testing of drivers suspected of being under the influence of alcohol or other drugs. During 2012, the Department held two DWI Checkpoints.



#### **Community Policing**



Community policing initiatives have been developed nationwide by local governments in an effort to help improve the quality of life. Community policing is a philosophy in which the community and local law enforcement collectively decide what local/neighborhood problems are and what resources can be used to address them.

Two officers serve as Community Service Officers. These officers interact with the community in helping it recognize and eliminate sources of crime. They work primarily with neighborhood residents and groups serving as a link between them, the Police Department, service agencies, and local government.



#### School Resource/DARE



The purpose of the School Resource Program is to assign specifically trained officers to the schools to provide a forum through which students, parents, faculty, and law enforcement officers can become better acquainted and, as a result, continue mutual respect for one another. The SRO's are involved in such activities as conducting classroom presentations, coordinating group discussions with students in areas of mutual concern, patrolling school premises and surrounding areas to reduce loitering and prevent criminal activities as well as stimulate student involvement in crime prevention programs.

#### **Airport Security**



Since May of 2002, the Cape Girardeau Police Department has been in contract with the Transportation Security Administration (TSA) to provide security at the Cape Girardeau Regional Airport. Officers are assigned to provide security for screening passengers and luggage.

#### **Nuisance Abatement**



There are currently three full-time Nuisance Abatement Officers and a part-time Nuisance Abatement Officer that serve in this Unit. They are responsible for animal control issues, litter, disabled vehicles, quality of life issues, and other health and nuisance abatement issues.

Due to the retirement of Parking Control Officer Jani Williams, parking control enforcement was reassigned to the Nuisance Abatement Division. Thus, statistics for 2012 show a dramatic increase in calls.

The Cape Girardeau Police Department houses a 29 bed, direct-supervision jail facility used primarily to house prisoners awaiting municipal trial or serving time for municipal ordinance violations. During the 2011 calendar year, the jail was operated by three full-time jailers. The table represents the demographic data relating to prisoners housed in 2012.

Designated prisoners are allowed to perform community service work in order to pay fines to the City of Cape Girardeau.

Training is the foundation of the Department's current and future performance. Task-specific and career development training assures the Department maintains performance at the highest professional standards. The Training Unit insures that all commissioned officers complete their state mandated POST program training hours during each three year reporting period.

In 2012, 75 officers participated in 2,208.5 hours of training.

#### Crime Prevention












Southeast Missouri Crime Stoppers currently offers a reward of up to \$1,000 to anyone who provides information that leads to the arrest of someone who commits a crime, leads authorities to the recovery of stolen property, causes the seizure of illegal drugs, or causes an arrest on an outstanding warrant. The program is allowed a segment on Mid-America's Most Wanted which allows wanted subjects to be featured and detailed. The program has led to the arrest of numerous wanted persons in Cape Girardeau and the surrounding areas.


























#### RETIREMENTS



Records Clerk Joan Daum began her employment with the Cape Girardeau Police Department on October 30, 2000. "Ms. Joan", as she was commonly referred to around the Department, was primarily responsible for the transcription of police reports. She served in this position until her retirement on January 27, 2012.



Parking Enforcement Officer Jani Williams began her employment with the Cape Girardeau Police Department on October 27, 1997 and was assigned to the Traffic Unit.

After serving the Department and the citizens of Cape Girardeau for 14 years, she retired on March 1, 2012.



Patrolman Robert Ross was appointed as a Patrolman to the Cape Girardeau Police Department on February 1, 1979. Patrolman Ross worked in the Patrol Division his entire law enforcement career.

After serving the Department and the citizens of Cape Girardeau for 33 years, Patrolman Ross retired on March 16, 2012.

#### RETIREMENTS



Carl Kinnison began his employment with the Cape Girardeau Police Department with a part-time position in 1978 as an animal control officer before he took a full-time Patrolman position on February 1, 1979. During his 33 ½ year tenure with the Department, he worked in the Patrol Division, Criminal Investigations Division, Crime Prevention, Crime Analysis, and served as the Department's Public Information Officer. It was in this position that he became known as "the voice of the Cape Girardeau Police Department."

On April 20, 1984, Carl was promoted to Sergeant. On September 23, 2000, he was promoted to Lieutenant and quickly rose through the administrative ranks. He was promoted the following year to the Captain of Operations (December 29, 2001) and served in this position until the retirement of Chief Steve Strong in 2005. It was at this time that City Manager Doug Leslie appointed him as the Department's Chief of Police on October 15, 2005.

Chief Kinnison was instrumental for the Department seeing advances in radio communication, technology, and equipment. With the Public Safety Tax, new police cruisers have been purchased yearly and grants have been received to add laptops to our patrol units.

Chief Kinnison accepted a full-time instructor position in the Department of Criminal Justice and Sociology at Southeast Missouri State University and retired from the Department on August 1, 2012.

These are short-term grants (usually a few to several days) for traffic enforcement. They are usually approved a few months in advance and we do not know if they will be available next fiscal year.

#### **ACCOMPLISHMENTS**

In June of 2004 the voters of Cape Girardeau passed a 1/4 cent Sales Tax by an overwhelming majority of 82%. The tax will generate an estimated \$10 million in revenue over 10 years for the purchase of Public Safety vehicles and operating equipment as well as for maintaining and building facilities.
