



As Police Chief for the City of Cape Girardeau, it is an honor and privilege for me to present the 2011 Annual Report. I hope you continue to find this report to be a beneficial source of information relating to the operation of our organization.

Year 2011 was another busy year for the Police Department. A quick statistical synopsis shows that officers responded to more than 51,000 calls for service; made 3,880 arrests; issued 6,311 traffic citations; completed nearly 11,000 written reports; and investigated a total of 2,730 Part I crimes.

While there was a slight overall increase in Part I Crimes when compared to 2010, there was a significant increase in the number of robberies reported this year. This is somewhat concerning. Aggressive steps have been taken to quickly and thoroughly investigate these incidents with appropriate resources so we can ensure we keep these acts of violence to a minimum. There were no significant changes in the other seven categories of Part I crimes.

A number of our accomplishments during 2011 are listed herein. One of the more significant accomplishments undertaken this year was outfitting 29 patrol and traffic units with mobile data terminals (laptop computers). The computers were provided through a Homeland Security grant. The computers will have a significant impact on how police officers perform their day-to-day operations. An incredible amount of information (from suspect data to weather radar maps) is now only a few keystrokes away. The laptop computers will allow our officers to patrol the City of Cape Girardeau more effectively and efficiently. During 2012, we hope to install laptops in the remainder of our patrol vehicles, and move toward an electronic ticketing system.





OPERATIONS BUREAU

The Operations Bureau provides the administrative foundation, professional standards, and technological innovations necessary to remain a leader in professional public services. There are several divisions within the Bureau with each supplying unique yet inter-dependant services.

PATROL DIVISION

Calls for Service: 51,247

The Patrol Division provides the primary law enforcement function of the Police Department by maintaining a uniform presence 24 hours a day and serving our citizens with highly trained officers who respond to any emergency or call for service. Led by Lieutenant John Davis, the Division consists of 42 uniformed officers. The Division is divided into four platoons of ten officers each and two K-9 officers. The four platoons work 12-hour shifts and each platoon consists of one sergeant, one corporal, and eight patrolmen. Two patrolmen on each platoon are designated as shift evidence technicians.



SPECIAL RESPONSE TEAM

Deployments: 23

The Special Response Team (SRT), commonly known as SWAT, is a group of highly trained tactical officers designed for deployment during critical incidents. These incidents include but are not limited to hostage situations, barricaded subjects, high-risk search warrants, high profile escorts, and crowd control.

The ten operators of the SRT serve on a voluntary, part-time basis. They train a minimum of eight hours per month in addition to the critical incident operations throughout the year. Lieutenant John Davis serves as Commander.

K-9 UNIT

The Cape Girardeau Police Department's K9 Unit utilizes two highly trained dogs who, along with their handlers, make up a unique team responsible for building searches and suspect searches as well as narcotic detection and tracking. In order for the police dogs to continue to be one of the most effective and diverse tools utilized in police work today, weekly training for the dogs and handlers are mandated.

In November of 2011, K9 Officer Jeff Bourbon resigned from the Department. Ptlm. Bryan Blanner, a 4 year veteran of the Department, was appointed as the new handler and will begin an extensive training with K9 Schupo under the direction of K9 Trainer Mike Ervin in March of 2012. We fully expect K9 Officer Blanner and K9 Schupo to be on the street by June of 2012.

PATROL DIVISION

DETECTIVE DIVISION

The Division of Criminal Investigation is charged with the responsibility of assigning manpower and resources to those investigations that require in-depth critical investigative review, identification, and the processing of individuals suspected of committing crimes in Cape Girardeau. The Detective Division works closely with other divisions of the Cape Girardeau Police Department and other law enforcement agencies to solve crime.

The Detective Division is divided into three units: the Criminal Investigations Unit, Scientific Investigations Unit, and the Professional Standards Unit. Led by Lieutenant Mark Majoros, the Division is comprised of one sergeant, four corporals, six investigators, and one civilian records clerk assigned to the Scientific Investigations Unit.

CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS UNIT

Three of the Unit's detectives are assigned to investigate drug cases full-time. Additionally, one detective is assigned to investigate juvenile crime and work as a liaison with the Cape Girardeau County Juvenile Office. The Unit also has a computer crimes investigator who specializes in forensic examinations of computers, internet crimes, and sex crime cases.

In 2011, the Unit was assigned 1,153 cases for investigation. The Unit reported a clearance rate of 25%.

SCIENTIFIC INVESTIGATIONS UNIT

This Unit is comprised of one supervisor and one records clerk. The Unit is responsible for maintaining all physical evidence collected by the Cape Girardeau Police Department; develop and maintain all photographs taken by the Department; and to process and maintain all fingerprints that are collected by the Department. In addition to personnel assigned to the Unit, each patrol platoon is assigned two evidence technicians who are trained in crime scene searches and collection and preservation of evidence. The Unit also works closely with the Southeast Missouri State University Regional Crime Laboratory and other local agencies.

In 2011, the Unit was charged with handling 1,282 cases that had evidence associated with it.

DETECTIVE DIVISION

PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS UNIT

The Professional Standards Unit investigates internal and external complaints of employee misconduct to determine if there were any violations of policy or law.

During 2011, three Professional Standards Investigations were conducted involving three officers. Of those investigations, one was an “Unfounded” complaint and two were sustained.

MAJOR CASE SQUAD

Several employees of the Cape Girardeau Police Department serve on the Cape Girardeau/Bollinger County Major Case Squad (MCS) in addition to their positions within the Department.

The MCS was initiated in the late 1970’s and early 1980’s when Cape Girardeau County was plagued with a series of murders. Since 1983, the MCS, made up of officers and detectives from seven law enforcement agencies has solved 38 of 41 cases.

MAJOR CASE SQUAD ACTIVATION

The MCS was activated June 2, 2011 to search for Jacque Sue Waller, a 39-year-old mother of 5 year-old triplets. Waller was last seen after 5 p.m. on June 1, 2011 by her estranged husband, James “Clay” Waller at his residence in Jackson, Missouri. Mr. Waller quickly became a person of interest in the investigation.



The MCS disbanded after being activated for 8 days and shortly after, the case gained national media attention. Leads are still being generated on an almost daily basis and investigators continue to follow-up on information as it becomes available.

This was the first activation of the Squad since the murder of Matthew Ervin on June 26, 2010. Thomas Evans, Jr., age 20, was acquitted of 2nd-degree murder and armed criminal action on September 8, 2011. Armster Robinson III, age 19, pled guilty to trafficking a controlled substance on September 13, 2011 and was sentenced to 5 years in prison.

DETECTIVE DIVISION

TRAFFIC

The Traffic Unit is staffed with one supervisory sergeant, one corporal, four commissioned police officers, and one civilian parking enforcement officer.



The Traffic Unit is responsible for a variety of traffic-related activities. The primary responsibilities of the Unit include traffic crash investigation, traffic enforcement, and traffic crash analysis which includes the reconstruction of major accidents. Other duties include traffic studies, parking enforcement, abandoned vehicle enforcement, and traffic direction. The Unit also assists in the coordination of special events. This includes parades or any walking event.

DUI

Officers are specially trained in the testing of drivers suspected of being under the influence of alcohol or other drugs. During 2011, the Department held two DWI Checkpoints.

SPECIAL OPERATIONS

AIRPORT SECURITY

Since May of 2002, the Cape Girardeau Police Department has been in contract with the Transportation Security Administration (TSA) to provide security at the Cape Girardeau Regional Airport. Officers are assigned to provide security for screening passengers and luggage.

During 2011, officers logged 1,368 hours at the Cape Girardeau Regional Airport.



COMMUNITY POLICING

Community policing initiatives have been developed nationwide by local governments in an effort to help improve the quality of life in that community. Community policing is a philosophy in which the community and local law enforcement collectively decide what local/neighborhood problems are and what resources can be used to address them.

Since 1994, a number of officers have been assigned to the position of Community Service Officer. In July of 2011, the Department added a second Community Service Officer. These officers interact with the community in helping it recognize and eliminate sources of crime. The officers work primarily with neighborhood residents/groups serving as a link between them, the Police Department, service agencies, and local government. Patrolman Richard Couch and Patrolman Joey Hann currently serve as the Community Service Officers.



SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS / DARE

The purpose of the School Resource Program is to assign specifically trained officers to the schools to provide a forum through which students, parents, faculty, and law enforcement officers can become better acquainted and, as a result, continue mutual respect for one another. The SRO's are involved in such activities as conducting classroom presentations, coordinating group discussions with students in areas of mutual concern, patrolling school premises, and surrounding areas to reduce loitering and prevent criminal activities as well as stimulate student involvement in crime prevention programs.

SPECIAL OPERATIONS

SUPPORT SERVICES BUREAU

The Support Services Bureau is made up of several Divisions and Units. The Bureau is led by Captain Jack Wimp.

RECORDS UNIT

The Records Unit is staffed with a Records Unit supervisor and four records information clerks. The Unit is responsible for data entry and file maintenance of all written reports.

The citizens of Cape Girardeau have access to the Unit during normal business hours to obtain information on police reports filed with the Department. The unit processes numerous requests for report copies on a daily basis. All traffic citations and parking citations are also processed through this Unit.

During 2011, the Unit processed 10,824 original police reports plus numerous supplemental reports.

JAIL UNIT

The Cape Girardeau Police Department houses a 29 bed, direct-supervision jail facility used primarily to house prisoners awaiting municipal trial or serving time for municipal ordinance violations. During the 2011 calendar year, the jail was operated by three full-time jailers and supervised by the Director of the Auxiliary Services Division. The table below represents the demographic data relating to prisoners admitted in 2011.

Designated prisoners are allowed to perform community service work in order to pay fines to the City.

LICENSING

The Auxiliary Services Division is also responsible for certain licensing services within the City of Cape Girardeau including security guard and liquor licenses. Applications for these licenses are submitted to the Department for review.

AUXILIARY SERVICES

TRAINING

The Training Division provides quality and up-to-date training to all police personnel. Training is accomplished by in-house education as well as classes provided by other institutions and organizations. The Division insures that all commissioned officers complete their state mandated POST (Peace Officers Standards and Training) program training hours during each three year reporting period. The Division also provides programs about various crime prevention topics to the citizens of Cape Girardeau.

In 2011, 75 officers participated in 2,939.5 hours of training.

MEDIA RELATIONS

The Cape Girardeau Police Department fosters cooperation and mutual respect between the Department and news media. The officers assigned as media liaisons for the Department are dedicated and highly trained individuals who understand the importance of using the media as a valuable resource to keep the public informed as to the Department's activities. In this regard, they realize that their role is to assist members of the media in completing the task of gathering information and reporting on news events impacting resident and visitors to the City of Cape Girardeau. The public's perception and image of the Department is largely dependant on the hard work of these officers.

CRIME PREVENTION

The community is provided with informational and educational crime prevention programs for school, businesses, and community organizations through the Crime Prevention Program. The topics of these programs are quite varied and include such things as robbery and burglary prevention, fraud, work place violence, gun safety, traffic safety, drug and alcohol awareness, and many others.

The Unit is involved in the training and coordination of the Citizen's Police Academy, conducting tours of Police Headquarters, conducting business and residential security surveys, and participating in annual community safety events and school career days.

TRAINING & COMMUNITY AFFAIRS

CRIME STOPPERS

Southeast Missouri Crime Stoppers currently offers a reward of up to \$1,000 to anyone who provides information that leads to the arrest of anyone who commits a crime, leads authorities to the recovery of stolen property, causes the seizure of illegal drugs, or causes an arrest on an outstanding warrant. The program is allowed a segment on Mid-America's Most Wanted. This segment allows wanted subjects to be featured and detailed. The program has led to the arrest of numerous wanted persons in Cape Girardeau and the surrounding areas.

SAFE COMMUNITIES PROGRAM

The goal of the Safe Communities Program is to provide injury prevention strategies, primarily in the area of traffic safety to the citizens of Cape Girardeau. The program has two full-time coordinators and a chairman and a 30-member advisory committee representing 28 agencies in the county. Grants through the Missouri Department of Transportation, Division of Highway Safety provides funding for this program.

Just one of many successful enforcement programs is the DWI enforcement patrol for the purpose of detecting and arresting intoxicated drivers, with the overall goal of reducing the number of alcohol impaired motorists in the City of Cape Girardeau. The patrol consists of officers working every Friday and Saturday night.





MURDER TEN YEAR COMPARISON




RAPE TEN YEAR COMPARISON





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

BURGLARY TEN YEAR COMPARISON




LARCENY TEN YEAR COMPARISON



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
ARSON TEN YEAR COMPARISON





CALLS FOR SERVICE FIVE YEAR COMPARISON




WRITTEN REPORTS FIVE YEAR COMPARISON


ARRESTS FIVE YEAR COMPARISON





Sergeant Dennis Horn

Sergeant Dennis Horn began his employment with the Cape Girardeau Police Department on March 17, 1986. He was assigned as an Evidence Technician in 1988. In October of 1991, the Department's K-9 Program was started. Officer Horn served as the Department's first K-9 handler and was instrumental in starting the program. He was promoted to Corporal on February 9, 2002 and on October 13, 2007, he was promoted to the rank of Sergeant. Due to his promotion, Sergeant Horn left the K-9 program as a handler after serving almost 11 years in that position. He served as a platoon leader in the Patrol Division and supervised the current K-9 officers up until his retirement on April 1, 2011.



Corporal Alvin Spencer

Corporal Alvin Spencer began his employment with the Cape Girardeau Police Department on October 1, 1984. He resigned from the Department in 1990 but remained on the Reserve Unit. 2011 Department Highlights



The Department upgraded to the Generation 4 Glock handguns with flashlights and holsters. The cost of the upgrade, the purchase of 77 streamlights, and 77 tactical holsters was \$16,757.75.



As a direct result from input from officers in the Patrol Division, the Department moved to a utility-style uniform. Officers were also provided with reflective coats.

The Department outfitted 29 patrol and traffic units with mobile data terminals (laptop computers). Funding was provided through a Homeland Security grant. During 2012, we hope to install laptops in the remainder of our patrol vehicles.

Other Equipment & Technology Upgrades

Barcoding - Three employees underwent training in a new barcoding system for evidence processing at the end of 2011. The barcoding system will be implemented on January 1, 2012.

Facial Recognition System - This system allows officers to run a face from a video surveillance image through a database and possibly obtain a series of “hits” from the system’s database.

Leads Online - Known as the nation’s largest online investigation system, the Department is working with the City in possibility initiating a City Ordinance that will require pawn shops to enter information into this database that will aide in investigating crimes.

DocView - An online accident system was implemented in the Records Division. Citizens involved in accidents and their insurance companies can now access the accident report online for a minimal fee.

Laserfische - A new way of microfilming implemented by our Records Division. In the past, reports were microfilmed and the reels were stored. This provides reports to be stored electronically.

SRT Van - Acquired from St. Charles County for \$3,000.

In June 2004, the voters of Cape Girardeau passed a 1/4 cent sales tax by an overwhelming majority of 82%. The tax will generate an estimated \$10 million in revenue over 10 years for the purchase of Public Safety vehicles and operating equipment as well as for maintaining and building facilities. These expenditures are being tracked through the Public Safety Trust Fund. These are the expenditures that have been made from this fund by the Police Department through 12-31-11.
